Whether you're just starting out or advancing your skills, our classes cover levels A1 to B2, including introductory and full-level programmes.



An European Project:

Dive into a visionary world where art, technology, and nature converge. SolarPunk, A Story of Sand and Energy is a transdisciplinary art project that unfolds Namibia's potential future(s) through radically optimistic storytelling.

It imagines technology-integrated, ecologically balanced, and socially just futures, grounded in Namibia's exceptional solar and wind resources, traditional knowledge systems, and collective ways of life. The project encourages a cultural conversation around what it means to imagine a sustainable Namibian future, not as a techno-fix, but as a lived aesthetic, social, and political transformation.

Solarpunk is defined here as a radically positive vision of the future, informed by green energy, fair trade, communal life, local knowledge, and an ethic of care for the natural world. It stands as both a counternarrative to dystopia and an invitation to imagine "what if everything goes right?" within the Namibian context and a Europe-Namibia art dialogue.

Developed during an artist residency in Swakopmund, this exhibition presents a bold exploration of utopian futures through the collaborative works of: Rocio Asensi from Spain, and Vitjitua Ndjiharine from Namibia.

Their artworks envision a world where humans coexist positively with the environment, reflecting on sustainable solutions for our planet. The exhibition is curated by Frieda Lühl, the Co-Director of The Project Room, and led by the Goethe-Institut Namibia as part of the EUNIC Namibia Cluster initiative.





FILM FEST Opportunities for Youth


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On the occasion of the European Film Festival, the Embassy of France in Namibia and the Franco-Namibian Cultural Centre presented « Jacky Caillou » by Lucas Delangle. Held throughout October, the festival brings together films from across Europe as well as two Namibian productions, under the theme: Opportunities for Youth. The screening took place on Wednesday, September 24, with around 80 people in attendance.

Set in a small village in the French Alps, the film follows Jacky, who lives with his grandmother, a healer. His meeting with Elsa, a young woman marked by a mysterious spreading stain, sparks a fragile love story touched by fear of the unknown. Meanwhile, the wolf roaming the mountains symbolizes both danger and wild freedom, echoing Jacky's own inner struggle.

Blending realism with the fantastic, Jacky Caillou explores themes of inheritance, identity, and the choices young people face when shaping their future. In this way, it resonates deeply with the festival's theme, showing that even in moments of doubt, youth carries the strength to create new opportunities.
